eyes as we listened to the students tell their stories," said Hufstедler. "It was touching to hear about the challenges they have faced and their appreciation for those who helped them overcome those challenges, including the donors who helped pave the way for their education."

Gibson followed up on their stories by sharing her own story of overcoming obstacles and challenges, and the fact that she, too, could not have done it without the help and support of others. "Over the years, I have come to realize that no matter how hard you try to do something on your own, without asking for help, you just can't do it," said Gibson. "Everyone needs help in even the smallest of ways."

"When I was diagnosed with cancer in March of 2010," Gibson continued, "it only took me about three seconds to realize that 'I can't go through this alone.' Without the support that I received, I could not have been so positive and determined. As we all struggle with life on a day to day basis, it is very rewarding to know that people have not given up on the challenge of helping others. As in my life - with struggles of school, work, being a wife, being a mother and battling cancer - I never could have done any of it without support and help from others."

"Be proud of what you have here at BRTC," Gibson added. "And, more importantly, remember that gifts can go an extremely long way. Through encouragement, advice, instruction and even monetary support, this college and its students will be a pinnacle aspect of all our lives in this community and to others as we celebrate these scholars and especially the donors that make this all happen."

The event concluded with student scholarship recipient Dillon Varner of Delaplaine winning a new 32 GB 8.9" HP Kindle Fire courtesy of an anonymous donor. The giveaway was an added surprise at the end of the event, and Varner held the 'winning' program.

Boozman Addresses 43 LETA Graduates

Arkansas Senator John Boozman addressed 43 officers during a graduation ceremony held April 12 for BRTC's Law Enforcement Training Academy (LETA). Graduating students completed a thirteen-week course that included instruction in standard police tactics, firearms, legal education, technical skills and practical exercises. Officers are required to score at least 70% on each exam, and consistently fire at least 80% during firearms training exercises in order to graduate.

Boozman stressed to the graduates the significance of their role in influencing the lives of young people and to never forget how important that is. He also praised the officers for their hard work and willingness to protect others when their efforts are often taken for granted.

A group of twenty BRTC Art Club members, faculty and staff enjoyed a two-day field trip to St. Louis and its various art and entertainment venues on April 12 and 13. Highlights of the trip included visits to the St. Louis Art Museum and the Arch.

On Friday, all participants viewed the Da Vinci Exhibit in the Bank of America Plaza, discovering many of Da Vinci's famous inventions and machines, then went on a docent-led tour of the St. Louis Art Museum, experiencing many masterworks of Monet, Picasso, Flemish painters, the Hudson River School, ancient Western civilizations, and more. On Saturday, the Art Club peeked into the iconic St. Louis Arch, walked through its Westward Expansion Museum, and watched a film on the building of the monument. Some of the group members opted to ride the elevator all the way to the top of the Arch, while others preferred the relatively less dizzying experience of a steamboat ride at Laclede's Landing. In the free time many participants split off into smaller groups to enjoy other attractions, such as the St. Louis zoo, carriage rides, train station, mall, and wax museum.

If you have not been on the campus at Black River Technical College for the past few years, you might notice a few changes regarding classroom delivery methods and support services for students. We are well into our second year of our PACE grant, designed to get students through their course of study more quickly, so they can go into the workforce or be ready to transfer to a four-year

institution. Our Distance Education Department has grown out of necessity, as the number of online and hybrid-class offerings have increased dramatically. These classes are usually the first to fill.

Despite the changes in how students receive class material, one constant remains! When a student is outside the classroom they often realize that they need additional help. That is what our new Learning Center is for! The Learning Center has been open to students since November, 2012, making it one of our newest structures and services on campus. The environment is pleasant and certainly conducive to learning.

The facility has an open area where most of the tutoring occurs. Students receive one-on-one help in math, English, science, or just about any subject they need. Our tutors are trained and are competent in the discipline they serve.

The Learning Center is much more than just a place where students can receive tutoring help. The facility also houses 29 computers in an area separated by glass doors. Students utilize these computers to work on papers and modular math assignments, and also use them for testing. When

students require a more private, quiet environment, there are two smaller rooms designed to study with a partner. There is also one larger room that will accommodate 6-8 students to work on projects or provide a meeting place for our active clubs on campus.

In addition to the new facility, we were able to hire a coordinator for The Learning Center. This person supervises the tutors, manages room and computer usage, and has become vitally important in implementing our student success plan. She has reached out to the faculty for their assistance and they have responded favorably by addressing specific needs of students with the coordinator.

Our goal is to improve student performance, which will increase the number of students retained and ultimately allow them to obtain their academic goals.

Please stop by The Learning Center the next time you are on campus. Hours of operation are Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, 8 a.m. till 4:30 p.m. On Wednesday the center is open from 8 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. We hope to be expanding these hours next fall.
