

Mackenzie Hibbs was chosen as the December graduate winner. The graduate winners were chosen at random by a drawing of numbers.

A group of 51 travelers, led by Fine Arts Instructor Dr. Sandy D. Baltz, will travel for a 7-day tour of Florence, Pisa, Assisi, and Rome over Spring Break of next year. Highlights of the trip include the Florence Leaning Tower of Pisa, St. Francis of Assisi Basilica, Pantheon, St. Peter's Basilica, Sistine Chapel, and the Colosseum. "This was a dream come true for many students. To travel overseas will be unbelievable! BRTC and SGA have given our students an amazing opportunity and gift," stated Baltz.
