



## BRTC Continues to Maintain the Highest Standards of Quality and Excellence

Black River Technical College continues to maintain its commitment to high-quality programs and maintains high standards for operations. As noted in last year's report, our most recent reaffirmation of accreditation with the Higher Learning Commission took place in April 2023, with full reaffirmation granted without stipulations. We remain on schedule for our next comprehensive evaluation in 2028–2029, and a multilocation review is set for the 2026–2027 academic year. In FY 2024–2025, there were no additions of new instructional locations or new academic programs; however, we are pleased to report that construction began on new barracks to provide on-campus housing for cadets enrolled in the Law Enforcement Training Academy, enhancing both recruitment and student support for that program.



During this past year, BRTC has also continued its exemplary work on two major, federally funded grants. Through our U.S. Department of Education grant, we will soon integrate Workforce Effectiveness Skills into the curricula of all creditbearing programs. This initiative ensures that students receive direct instruction in, and assessment of, critical workforce skills—such as communication, professionalism, and teamwork—and that demonstration of these skills will be documented on a dedicated Workforce Effectiveness Skills transcript. In tandem, our U.S. Department of Labor-funded project to expand student services offered in our healthcare CTC programs is underway. Collectively, these efforts reflect BRTC's ongoing dedication to academic quality, student success, and continuous institutional improvement.

Providing corporate, community, and custom training is a large part of BRTC's mission to the community.








